


Lisa Fishman is the author of five collections of poetry, most recently Flower Cart (Ahsahta Press, 2011) and Current (Parlor Press, 2011). She has lived on a farm in Orfordville, Wisconsin, for 13 years and is also Associate Professor of English and Director of Poetry at Columbia College Chicago.



Karl Gartung cofounded the Woodland Pattern Book Center with Anne Kingsbury and Karl Young in 1980. He is the author of Now that Memory Has Become So Important. He co-lead a Bjorklunden workshop on Lorine Niedecker and was co-organizer of the 2003 Niedecker Centenary celebration.

Paul G. Hayes reported about environment, energy and natural sciences for The Milwaukee Journal from 1962 until 1987, and for Wisconsin, The Journal's Sunday



magazine until 1995, the year The Journal merged with the Milwaukee Sentinel and he retired. While writing for Wisconsin, he often profiled outstanding Wisconsin citizens, including Lorine Niedecker, a story that concentrated on the years of her marriage to Al Millen, her most productive years as a poet. Most recently he co-authored with Martha Bergland Studying Wisconsin: The Life of Increase Lapham. Hayes and his wife Philia live in Cedarburg where they raised two sons and where he continues to write.



Dion Kempthorne played on the 1963 Wisconsin Rose Bowl team, earned a PhD in English at UW-Madison, taught writing and literature in the UW Colleges, and served as CEO/Dean at UW-Richland. Now a professor emeritus, he lives in the woods of Richland County and spends his days reading, writing, hiking, and cutting firewood. His poems have appeared in the Wisconsin Academy Review, Verbatim, Verse Wisconsin, The Capitola Review, Mature Years, Wisconsin People & Ideas, Julien's Journal, and the Wisconsin Poets' Calendar. Kempthorne was the first-place winner of the Wisconsin People & Ideas 2014 poetry contest. In addition to writing poems, he is at work on a memoir that explores the personal benefits of reading and writing poetry.



Karen Laudon is a visual artist living with her two daughters in Madison, Wisconsin. Educated at UW- Madison and the San Francisco Art Institute, she lived for many years in the bay area. She works in series, incorporating closely related oil paintings, sculpture, and mixed media drawings. Having deep roots in Wisconsin, and having grown up in a local lake, her affinity with Lorine Niedecker's poetry and life is a natural one. Both have had a profound impact on Laudon's work over the past twenty years, resulting in her two most recent series, including the collaborative effort with poet Emilie Lindemann. Laudon's work has been shown nationally, with modest success.



Emilie Lindemann holds a PhD in English from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee's creative writing program. She lives in rural Manitowoc County and is an assistant professor of English at Silver Lake College. Emilie is the author of several poetry chapbooks: Dear Minimum Wage Employee, The Queen of the Milky Way, and Small Adult Trees (forthcoming)--all from Dancing Girl Press. In her free-time, she's part of an art rock group called Villainess.



Amy Lutzke is the Adult Services Librarian at the Dwight Foster Public Library. As such she has had the opportunity to be immersed in the world of Lorine Niedecker. Growing up on the shore of Lake Michigan she is a child of the water and considers herself lucky to live on the bank of the might Rock River.



Richard Meier is the author of three books of poetry, In the Pure Block of the Whole Imaginary (Omnidawn, 2012), Shelley Gave Jane a Guitar (Wave, 2006), and Terrain Vague, (Wave/Verse, 2001). He is writer-in-residence at Carthage College and lives in Madison and Chicago.
